THE NOVA SCOTIA NATURE TRUST AND THE TOWN OF WOLFVILLE TAKE TO THE TRAILS

Wolfville, N.S. (February 9, 2015) –On Saturday February 8th, a crowd of over 30 people gathered at the Wolfville Watershed Nature Preserve, (Kings County) to take part in the 4th annual guided snowshoe hike on the property.

Protected by the Town of Wolfville and the Nature Trust in 2007, the Watershed is now one of the Nature Trust's most visited protected properties. The Wolfville Watershed Nature Preserve is used year round by many community groups including Scouts Canada, birders and other naturalists groups. In addition, local community members have installed Wood Duck boxes and boxes for Barred Owls. The property is also a research site for endangered Atlantic Salmon conservation initiatives.

"We were thrilled to team up with the Town of Wolfville again to host this moonlit hike. The goal of the winter hike is to encourage people to get outside to enjoy Nova Scotia's natural beauty, despite the cold weather. The Wolfville Watershed is the perfect location because it is spectacular in every season! This year there was no shortage of snow and we had a great turnout. It is always pretty magical to experience the Wolfville Watershed at night." said Nature Trust Land Stewardship Coordinator, Alice Morgan.

The 605 acre Wolfville Watershed property was permanently protected through a ground-breaking conservation easement signed by the Town of Wolfville and the Nature Trust in 2007. This agreement represented the first time a Canadian municipality partnered with a non-governmental organization to permanently protect a municipally-owned natural area.

The Watershed's many exceptional natural features, including undisturbed wetlands containing rare orchids and an old-growth hemlock stand, are now conserved forever, and the protected area is open for the public to visit year round. The property remains in Municipal ownership and is stewarded jointly with the Nature Trust and the Town of Wolfville.
